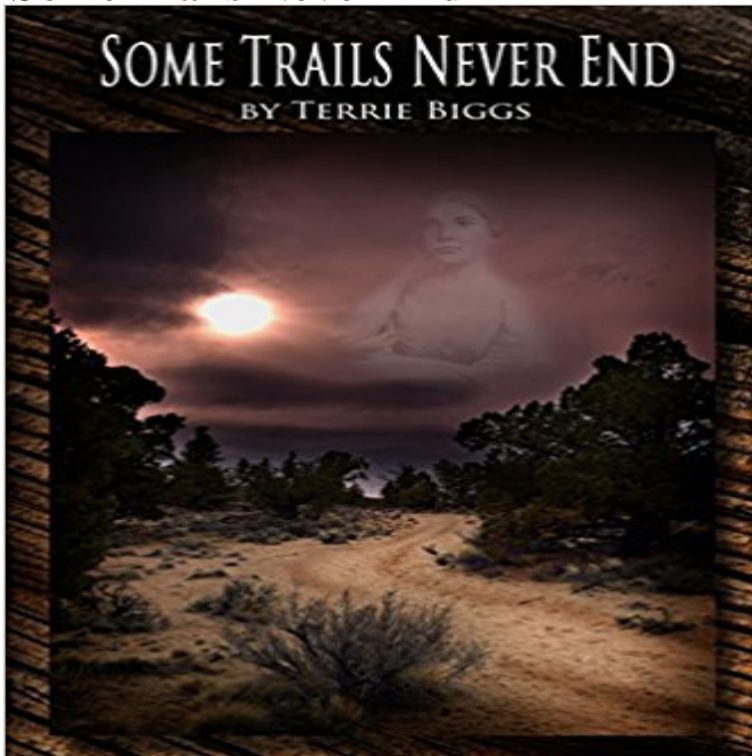


Some Trails Never End



Some Trails Never End is the story of two missionary families' inspiring and tragic story. The two wives were the first American women to go overland to the Pacific Northwest, which ultimately resulted in the formation of the Oregon Trail, and how the families forever changed the lives of the indigenous tribes of the Pacific Northwest. The story begins with the culture of the Cayuse tribe as told by Chief Stickus, as he tells about his childhood experiences. Stickus became friends with the two missionary families and continued his narrative until his fellow brothers were hanged. In the meantime, Marcus and Narcissa Whitman lived a most remarkable, courageous, and often ignorant life among the Cayuse, ending in tragedy. Seven Sager children were taken in by the Whitmans and raised as their own. Catherine, the oldest girl, tells of their heartbreaking journey west, their adventurous life at the mission, and their terrifying experiences during and after the attack on the mission in 1847. Lorinda Bewley was a young woman rescued from the mission by a local chief who relates her harrowing ordeal as the chief took her as a wife. Find out the price that was paid for her ransom. The trial of the Cayuse accused of the killings ends with what a legendary Cayuse chief did to save his people.
