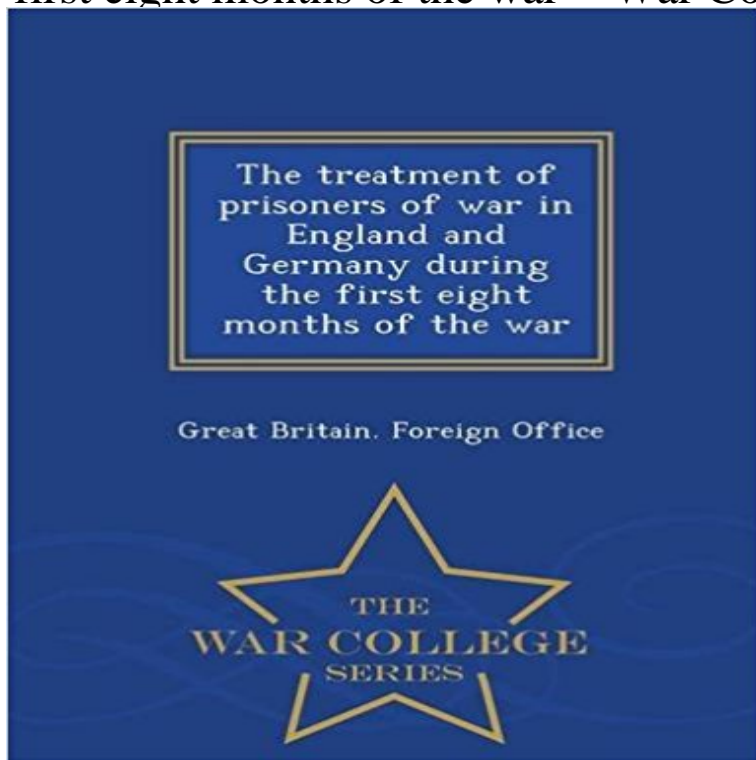


The treatment of prisoners of war in England and Germany during the first eight months of the war - War College Series
